What is Sport Premium?

Sport Premium is an amount of money which the government has agreed to allocate to schools. The funding amount schools receive is based upon the number of children of primary age the school has at January of that year. The sport premium is to be used to increase the quality & breadth of PE & Sport provision, and increasing participation in PE & Sport. At St. Godric's Catholic Primary School, we strive to promote healthy and active lifestyles and aim to provide sporting opportunities for all our pupils.

Rationale:

At St Godric's Catholic Primary School we believe that a high quality and enjoyable physical education programme is important for the development of all children's confidence and social skills as well as promoting healthy lifestyles. Through our curriculum we offer the children opportunities to compete both against themselves and others, in order to build self-confidence, resilience and a sense of fair-play. Our curriculum planning has been developed alongside Easington School Sports Partnership to ensure all children are given the opportunities to develop skills, regardless of age, ability or prior experience.

£6,567 was invested in the Easington School Sport Partnership Service Level Agreement.


